## President's Column

Over the past few years, the makeup of the MDA board has changed and brings new ideas and ways to further engage, excite, and deliver value for the neighborhood. Although my presidency and my time on the board ends on December 31, I am excited to be passing the torch to M.A. Powers, our current secretary. She previously served on the board of a homeowners' association in Henrico and has brought fresh ideas to the table, such as MDA's presence on Instagram.

Edwin Slipek is a native of Richmond. He attended Richmond Public Schools, Boston University, and Virginia Commonwealth University.

For 25 years, he has been an awardwinning architecture critic for Style Weekly where he serves as senior

contributing editor. Edwin is an adjunct instructor of architectural history at Virginia Commonwealth University and taught for 16 years at the Maggie Walker Governor's School for Government and International Studies.

Currently he is writing a biography and examination of the architectural work of early 20th century Richmond architect W. Duncan Lee in collaboration with the Historic Richmond Foundation.

#### KNOW THE RULES – BIKE SAFETY

As more Richmonders hit their bikes for exercise and fun, it is important for everyone to know the rules of the road.

#### For Cyclists:

- Bicycles are vehicles when ridden on roads and streets:
- Follow rules that apply to motor vehicles
- Obey all traffic signs, signals, lights, and markings
- Ride on the right side, with traffic
- Stay as far to the right as safely possible or use the shoulder
- Ride no more than two side by side
- · Ride single file when moving slower than traffic
- Yield to pedestrians
- Call to pedestrians when approaching from behind and to pass
- Use hand signals for turns and stops
- When turning, use motor vehicle turn lanes
- Keep one hand on the handlebars when carrying articles
- Don't carry adults on bicycles not built for more than one
- Carry children securely in special seats or trailers
- Don't wear earphones in both ears
- Use white headlamps visible 500 feet when bicycling between sunset and sunrise
- Use rear reflectors at night; if using roads with speed limits of 35 mph or more, use a red taillight visible 600 feet
- Be sure brakes work properly
- Obey local ordinances for riding on sidewalks, wearing a helmet, and having a bicycle license

#### For Motorized Vehicle Drivers

- **Drive Cautiously.** Reduce speed when encountering cyclists. Don't tailgate, especially in bad weather. Recognize hazards cyclists may face and give them space.
- **Yield to Cyclists.** Bicycles are considered vehicles. Cyclists should be given the appropriate right of way. Allow extra time for cyclists to traverse intersections.
- **Be Considerate.** Scan for cyclists in traffic and at intersections. Do not blast your horn in close proximity to cyclists. Look for cyclists when opening doors.
- **Pass with Care.** When passing, leave three feet between you and a cyclist. Wait for safe road and traffic conditions before you pass. Check over your shoulder before moving back.
- Watch for Children. Children on bicycles are often unpredictable. Expect the unexpected and slow down. Don't expect children to know traffic laws. Because of their size children can be harder to see.

The Richmond Police Department asks that residents leave lights burning from dusk to dawn on front and back porches. Hardware stores even have timers that will do the remembering for you! It is a proven fact that leaving your front and back porch lights burning from dusk to dawn helps deter crime for you, your neighbors, and the entire Museum District.

While you're at it, please consider installing motion detectors near your garage and alley to deter crime there as well.

It costs just pennies a day, so, please consider leaving these lights on year-round to help fight crime. Everyone will benefit!

## Richmond Police Department Spotlight Meet Officer Christopher Cirino

Title: Police Officer III

How long have you been with the RPD and in Sector 311? I have been with the Richmond Police Department for 11 years, of that six have been in Sector 311 patrolling the areas of the Museum District and beyond.

What is unique about patrolling in the Museum District? What is unique about patrolling the Museum District is having the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts in the area, and the amount of tourists who visit the area from different cultures.

What is a fun fact that most people don't know about you? I have been a Patrolman in N.Y. since 1985, Volunteer Ambulance for Port Jefferson N.Y. six years, and Selden Volunteer Fire Department seven years as a firefighter and a medic.

What is the most exciting/rewarding thing about your job? The most rewarding aspects of my job are the good contacts I make with ordinary citizens, talking about issues in the community, weather, fishing, and whatever topic pops up. I value life and helping people in their time of need.

What is a typical day like for you? The typical day consists of running from one end of the zone to the other answering calls for

service. When it is slower I spend the time circulating through neighborhoods looking for things that are out of place, and talking to citizens.

Why is it important to report suspicious/out of place activity? The citizens that live in the community know what is normal or not, or out of place.

The information needs to be shared with other neighbors and most importantly relayed to the police units that patrol the area.

How does it help? The information helps us to focus on areas that need more attention. Armed with the dates, times of occurrences, and descriptions of individuals involved in suspicious activity helps us to be more effective in being able to handles issues in the neighborhood.


We had a huge turnout of about 120 neighbors, and were excited to see many new faces.

**S**words, knives, and other costume accessories should be short, soft, and flexible.

**A**void trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.

 ${f F}$ asten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.

**E**xamine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Limit the amount of treats you eat.

**H**old a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you.

Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.

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
#### Museum District Zoning Map

The primary purpose of zoning is to guide and control land and building uses, segregating uses that are thought to be incompatible, and preventing new development that might interfere with existing uses or negatively impact the "character" of a community. The Museum District has several different zoning categories within its borders, and several more just outside. Which category is your home in? And just what does that mean? This map and abbreviated description of each residential zoning category should begin to answer those questions, but to learn more, check out the Citizens Guide to Residential Zoning Districts & Regulations on the City website, RichmondGov.com.

- **R6** Single-Family Attached Residential: intended to preserve and enhance older residential neighborhoods characterized by a mixture of detached single and two-family dwellings situated on modest sized lots. Maximum height: 35 ft.
- **R48** Multifamily-Residential: intended to encourage townhouse or garden-type apartments in sections of the City where traffic and utility systems accommodate such density. In addition to residences, by right uses include day nurseries and adult day care facilities. Maximum height: 35 ft.
- **R73** Multifamily Residential District: intended to encourage development of a medium-density neighborhood comprised of a mix of residential uses while promoting a pedestrian-oriented urban environment. Maximum height: 150 ft.

- **RO2** Residential-Office District: intended to encourage mixed use development which supports and incorporates into it business uses appropriate to the neighborhood. Allowable uses include parking decks, offices, banks, hospitals and funeral homes. Maximum height: 35 ft. (60 ft. on lots of 2 or more acres).
- **B1** Neighborhood Business District: intended to preserve smaller, retail and service focused business appropriate for a residential neighborhood. Excludes newly constructed buildings larger than 10,000 square feet, as well as facilities with drive-up service or fuel dispensing equipment. Allows residential uses, but not on ground floor. Maximum height: 25 ft.
- **B-2** Community Business District: intended to encourage development of more intensive business uses serving community at large, while protecting neighboring residential areas. Allows a wide variety of business uses, including automobile-oriented business, provided they are not in a transition zone to residential areas. Maximum height: 35 ft.
- **B-3** General Business District: intended to encourage and preserve commercial areas and corridors. The most permissive business zoning, outside of the Central Business District and specialized mixed-use districts, that includes protections to maintain uninterrupted commercial frontage. Maximum height: 35 ft. (60 ft. under certain conditions).

## UCI ROAD WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS RICHMOND 2015 | USA




1708 Gallery's InLight Richmond 2015 will be held on Friday, November 13 on the VMFA grounds. InLight is a public exhibition of light-based art - interactive projects, video, sculpture, performances, and more. Each year, InLight invites artists to respond to a particular site in our diverse city, attracting audiences to unique areas of Richmond. Over seven years, 1708's InLight has featured 190 local, national and international artists and artist collectives across some of Richmond's most unique neighborhoods and sites, from Broad Street to historic Tredegar to Monroe Park, and has engaged over 30,000 visitors. The partnership with VMFA continues this tradition of engaging with the histories and narratives of some Richmond's most evocative spaces.

The free event, from 7:00 AM until midnight, will include access to VMFA, which will stay open until midnight in honor of the event. *InLight 2015* will include special curated projects by Derek Larson, SuttonBeresCuller, Jacco Olivier, Ander Mikalson and John Dombrowski, and Jacob Stanley and will feature a selection of juried artworks selected by Alex Baker of Fleisher/Ollman Gallery in Philadelphia.

Leading up to *InLight*, 1708 organizes lantern-making workshops with partners throughout the city, including schools, non-profits and other arts organizations. New this year, 1708 is collaborating with the VMFA to coordinate a series of artist-led workshops that create lanterns inspired by work in the VMFA's permanent collections. All workshop participants, as well as the general public, are invited to walk in the Community


Lantern Parade that kicks off *InLight*. *InLight* also features community-based projects from other arts and cultural organizations and non-profits.
